Storm Drains Are For Rain Water Only

They may be small, but they add up. Grass clippings and leaves blown into the street during yard maintenance don't just disappear; they end up in the nearest river or plugging local storm sewer systems. When it rains, anything in the street washes into storm drains that lead to ree creeks and rivers. Why should you be concerned? Organic matter such as grass and leaves can cause odors in neighborhood creeks and drainage problems that lead to flooding.

So what's the best place for yard trimmings?

- Blow grass clippings back onto the lawn where they become a natural fertilizer.
- Rake or blow excess mulching into a compost pile where they can decompose without odor.
- Collect them and put them into a yard waste bin that the City picks up weekly for a small fee.

You can help the City's ongoing efforts of keeping our rivers and streams clean. Private citizens can report potential pollutant sources, such as mud or debris running off a construction site or illegal dumping into the storm water inlets in the streets by calling 308-233-3234, or by utilizing Access Kearney.
